The California Association of Councils of Governments (CalCOG) is comprised of 44 member organizations that serve as a council of government, metropolitan planning organization, regional transportation planning agency, or county transportation commission or authority. CalCOG serves as a convener, bringing together its members, the League of California Cities, and the California State Association of Counties, to share information on successful regional programs. CalCOG also works to assist each member agency in developing capacity to serve its member's needs for regional coordination and policy development.

This delegate will represent the Commission at the Leadership Conference April 5-7, 2020 along with the Executive Director.

The Executive Director participates on the CalCOG Directors Association of California (CDAC). CDAC meets on a regular basis (approximately every other month) to examine and discuss relevant regional, state, and federal issues, and serves as a staff resource and advisory body to the CalCOG Governing Council. EDCTC's annual CalCOG dues for 2019/20 are \$3,300.00, which is based on a population factor.

DISCUSSION

The organization supports and improves the effectiveness of the membership in addressing regional issues such as transportation, air quality, financial, housing, environmental, economic, and related topics. This is achieved through education and information sharing among the members and with others, such as regulatory, funding, and decision-making entities. SUBJECT: FEDERAL ADVOCACY PARTNER AGENCY MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

REQUESTED ACTION

- 1. Authorize the Executive Director to negotiate a Draft Memorandum of Understanding (MOU), (Attachment A) between the City of Placerville, El Dorado County, El Dorado Transit (partner agencies) and El Dorado County Transportation Commission, to solicit, secure, and administer Federal Transportation Advocacy Services.
- 2. Authorize the Executive Director to release a Request for Proposals to solicit Federal Transportation Advocacy services and administer a procurement process and execute a contract in coordination with partner agencies entered into aforementioned MOU.

BACKGROUND

EDCTC and the City of Placerville, El Dorado County, and El Dorado Transit work together in partnership to advance transportation projects and programs. Federal funding is one of the necessary means to deliver transportation projects. Often advocacy for projects at the Federal level is important in order to elevate the importance and visibility of a given project or need. Federal grant programs such as BUILD and INFRA continue to be more and more competitive and require additional advocacy and support. Currently, none of the partner agencies are under contract with any Federal advocacy service providers.

DISCUSSION

At the request of the EDCTC in December 2019, staff-initiated discussions with the partner agencies to determine the best approach to explore Federal advocacy services. Based on these discussions EDCTC and partner agencies determined an MOU would be most appropriate and cost effective. If approved, EDCTC will work with partner agencies to develop an MOU which will allow for EDCTC to execute procurement and administration of an advocacy contract. Furthermore, the MOU will clearly identify the financial commitment and coordination roles and responsibilities of each partner agency.

The MOU and resulting advocacy contract will allow for EDCTC to work directly with partner agencies individually or collectively to advance transportation projects and programs throughout El Dorado County. In order to initiate advocacy as soon as possible to include the next cycle of Federal INFRA Grant funding, staff is recommending release of the Request for Proposals (RFP) in parallel with development of the Draft MOU. The Final MOU will be presented to the EDCTC and partner agencies for final approval. Should approval of the MOU not be reached, the RFP would-be put-on hold until such time that agreement on the MOU could be met.

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING FEDERAL ADVOCACY

This Memorandum of Understanding is entered into between the City of Placerville, El Dorado County, El Dorado County Transit Authority, (partner agencies) and the El Dorado County Transportation Commission (EDCTC). EDCTC is executing this Memorandum of Understanding ("MOU") with its partner agencies to advance Federal advocacy to support transportation and other infrastructure projects and programs in El Dorado County and the City of Placerville.

WHEREAS, the City of Placerville, El Dorado County, El Dorado County Transit Authority, and EDCTC have come together to collaborate and to advance transportation and infrastructure projects and programs with Federal funding and support through a Federal advocacy service provider; and

WHEREAS, the partners listed below have agreed to enter into a collaborative agreement in which EDCTC will be the lead agency and the other agencies will be partners in Federal advocacy services; and

WHEREAS, the partners herein desire to enter into a Memorandum of Understanding setting forth the services to be provided by the collaborative.

SECTION 1: Description of Partner Agencies

The City of Placerville is the only incorporated City located within the EDCTC Regional Transportation Planning Agency (RTPA) boundaries. The City has a long-standing relationship with EDCTC as a planning partner and funding recipient.

El Dorado County is responsible for delivery of projects and programs which support the transportation system throughout the County. The West Slope of El Dorado County, Echo Summit west, is entirely encompassed by the EDCTC RTPA jurisdiction. The County has a long-standing relationship with EDCTC as a planning partner and funding recipient.

The El Dorado County Transit Authority is the sole transit provider within the EDCTC RTPA jurisdiction. El Dorado County Transit Authority provides a variety of transit services for residents of El Dorado County and fixed route services into Sacramento. As the sole transit operator, El Dorado Transit works closely with EDCTC to secure transit funding and perform transit planning functions.

SECTION II: PURPOSE AND PRINCIPLES

The purpose of this MOU is to coordinate Federal advocacy for the purposes of securing Federal funding and support for transportation, transit and other essential infrastructure projects, programs, and services which serve El Dorado County and the City of Placerville.

For the purposes of maximizing efficiencies, avoiding duplication, inconsistencies, and unnecessary expenditure of public funds, EDCTC will procure and administer Federal advocacy services to support the transportation needs of all partner agencies involved.

SECTION III: ROLES AND RESPONSIBILITIES

NOW, THEREFORE, it is hereby agreed by and between the partners as follows:

- 1) El Dorado County Transportation Commission (EDCTC) will coordinate directly with the partner agencies to oversee and manage procurement of Federal advocacy services. EDCTC will contribute % annually for services rendered under a contract approved by the EDCTC.
- 2) The City of Placerville will provide EDCTC with coordination and support to advance Federal advocacy of transportation projects and programs. The City of Placerville will contribute %

- annually for services rendered under a contract supported by the City of Placerville and approved by the EDCTC.
- 3) El Dorado County will provide EDCTC with coordination and support to advance Federal advocacy of transportation and infrastructure projects and programs. El Dorado County will contribute % amount annually for services rendered under a contract supported by El Dorado County and approved by the EDCTC.
- 4) El Dorado County Transit Authority will provide EDCTC with coordination and support to advance Federal advocacy of transportation projects and programs. El Dorado County Transit Authority will contribute % amount annually for services rendered under a contract supported by El Dorado County Transit Authority and approved by the EDCTC.

SECTION IV: TERM

This MOU shall become effective upon its execution by all parties. The MOU shall continue to be effective until terminated by one of the parties after 60 days' written notice to each of the other parties.

SECTION V: COUNTERPARTS

This MOU has been executed four (4) original counterparts, one of which shall be retained by each party to this MOU and any one of which can be used as the original.

TRANSPORTATION PLANS

REQUESTED ACTIONS

Accept the final City of Placerville and El Dorado County Active Transportation Plans.

BACKGROUND

On October 18, 2017, EDCTC submitted an application to Caltrans for a Fiscal Year 2017/2018 Sustainable Transportation Planning Grant to fund development of the El Dorado County and City of Placerville Active Transportation Plans (Active Transportation Plans). On December 15, 2017 Caltrans notified EDCTC that the Active Transportation Plans had been selected for funding with an award of \$100,003. EDCTC committed \$17,648 in matching funds for the project. Additionally, EDCTC coordinated with the El Dorado Hills Community Services District who agreed to contribute an additional \$10,000 in funding for targeted work efforts completed in the El Dorado Hills area.

On June 7, 2018, the EDCTC Board authorized the Executive Director to enter into a contract with Alta Planning + Design to develop the Active Transportation Plans for a not-to-exceed amount of \$100,000. The contract was fully executed in July of 2018 and on September 6, 2018 the EDCTC Board ratified the membership of the Stakeholder Advisory Committee which includes a diverse group of representatives from bicycle and pedestrian advocacy organizations, chambers of commerce; business, community, or tourist-oriented groups; schools, youth, health organizations, senior representatives, public agencies, community, and transit service providers.

DISCUSSION

Consistent with California statewide transportation goals to encourage alternatives to driving and develop a multi-modal transportation system, EDCTC has prepared the Active Transportation Plans for the City of Placerville and El Dorado County. The Active Transportation Plans will help increase the number of walking and biking trips, improve safety and mobility, enhance public health, reduce emissions, and increase opportunities to obtain funding to advance active transportation projects.

The Draft Active Transportation Plans were developed with considerable input from stakeholders and the general public. Three stakeholder meetings were held as well as three non-traditional outreach events at the El Dorado Hills and Placerville Farmer's Market's and the 2019 Earth Day event in Placerville. Additionally, a custom web-based interactive mapping tool was launched to allow residents to identify walking and biking destinations, barriers, and routes that could be improved. The web-based map received 517 responses from over 150 unique users.

The Active Transportation Plans provide recommended infrastructure improvements including new sidewalks, bicycle facilities, spot improvements and options for education, encouragement, enforcement, and evaluation programs. The Active Transportation Plans also include recommended projects within each Supervisorial District, prioritized based on typical scoring rubric for competitive active transportation funding programs. Comprehensive Design Guidelines are included in Appendix A

to serve as a useful reference to engineers and planners as projects are considered for delivery. The guidelines place an emphasis on context sensitive active transportation projects that complement the rural environment of El Dorado County and the City of Placerville.

The Draft Active Transportation Plans were presented to the EDCTC Board on December 5, 2019. Comments were accepted on the draft plans through January 15th, 2020. Two public meetings were held in January to provide an additional opportunity for public input on the recommendations included in the plans. Meetings were held from 5:00-7:00pm at the Placerville Town Hall on Wednesday, January 8th and at the El Dorado Hills Community Services District on Wednesday January 15th. Attendees provided minor clarifications to map alignments and additional input toward the recommendations in the plans.

As a result of the January public meetings, the following changes were made to the proposed improvements included in the El Dorado County Active Transportation Plan:

- Include proposed improvements in the Coloma area, consistent with the Coloma Sustainable Community Mobility Plan
- Correct mapping alignments on Country Club Drive extension
- Correct mapping alignments on the extension of the El Dorado Trail in the Camino area
- Include future Diamond Springs Parkway alignment on maps with proposed Class II Bike Lanes
- Add Class I Bike Path in the vicinity of Bass Lake Regional Park, along the north side of Bass Lake Road between Silver Springs Parkway and Serrano Parkway
- Change the proposed Class II Bike Lanes to Class IV bikeway along White Rock Road between Old Silva Valley Road and Valley View Parkway
- Include a proposal to construct the Brockliss Bridge in the Pacific House area along the Pony Express Trail
- Change Gold Ridge Trail and Onyx Trail Roads from proposed Class II Bike Lanes to Proposed Class III Bike Routes
- Edit maintenance costs in Chapter 8, Figure 8-2, 8-3 and 8-4, consistent with comments received by El Dorado County DOT Maintenance

SUBJECT: FREEWAY SERVICE PATROL 2019 REPORT

REQUESTED ACTION

None. This item is for information only.

BACKGROUND

On May 5, 2016 the El Dorado County Transportation Commission (EDCTC) entered into a Professional Services Agreement with Extreme Towing of Placerville to continue a Freeway Service Patrol (FSP) on US 50 in El Dorado County. FSP began on December 13, 2010 and now operates from 6:30 AM to 9:00 AM and from 4:00 PM to 7:00 PM Monday through Friday. FSP is a congestion relief program which provides emergency tow and other services to the travelling public on US 50 from the El Dorado/Sacramento County line extending eastward to Greenstone Road. FSP is funded by the Capital Valley Regional Service Authority for Freeways and Expressways and the Caltrans FSP program. *No local funds are required to provide FSP service in El Dorado County.*

DISCUSSION

EDCTC works closely with the California Highway Patrol (CHP) to administer the FSP. CHP performs tow truck operator and vehicle inspections and monitors daily FSP operations. CHP provides inspection reports to and communicates with EDCTC regularly. EDCTC monitors the quality of FSP service through an online survey which each assisted motorist is directed to at the time of service. The survey offers the assisted motorist the opportunity to rate the quality of the service, make comments, and recommend improvements. To date, EDCTC has received many completed surveys, all of which highly praise the El Dorado County FSP. All survey responses rate the FSP as "excellent" and thank the EDCTC for providing the service. Some of the comments received include:

"John Bradford was very helpful in the concern of my safety. I was very hesitant at the beginning and it took some time to convince me he was who he said he was and his purpose. He presented everything I needed to know to convince me that I'd be ok getting in his tow truck. He was very polite with a good sense of humor. He hitched up my vehicle and got me and my car to a safe place off the freeway. It's good to know that services exist to get you safely off the road. Thank You!

"Very great program, the tow truck showed up within minutes of me breaking down. It made it alot easier to try to fix my truck once I was off the freeway and safe from traffic."

"I was very thankful for the help that John provided for me this evening. If not for him I possibly could of been waiting for several more hours. He was very concerned about my safety and was a pleasure to talk to. He was very personable and a great smile which made this experience a bit more pleasant. Don't want this ever to happen again, but if it should I hope to see him on the road!" In addition to the online survey, EDCTC monitors the FSP by recording and monitoring specific details of the FSP duties performed. Each motorist assist is recorded via a mobile device application by the tow truck driver. The assist record includes information regarding the time and date, type of vehicle, location, type, and duration of assist performed. To date El Dorado County FSP service has been operating on par with many of the more urban FSP services. EDCTC collects and records this information monthly.
