Why hold a visioning workshop?

The formation of the Diamond Springs and El Dorado Community Advisory Committee in 2009 and the findings of the State Route 49 Realignment Study in 2010 made it clear that there is a need to ask meaningful questions about what the communities of Diamond Springs and El Dorado want to look like physically, economically, socially, and environmentally in 5, 10, or 20 years.

In response to this need, the El Dorado County Transportation Commission (EDCTC) began the Diamond Springs and El Dorado Area Mobility and Sustainable Community Vision Project (Vision Project) in March 2011 to initiate a dialog with the community about how to address mobility issues, to draft core values, and create a vision for the future.

The Planning Process



The Diamond Springs and El Dorado Area Mobility and Sustainable Community Vision Project (Vision Project) utilized the Diamond Springs and El Dorado Stakeholder Advisory Committee (SAC) to draft core values and a community vision through a series of five meetings during the spring and summer of 2011. A Community Visioning Workshop was held on October 27, 2011 to provide the public with an opportunity to weigh in on the concepts developed by the SAC.





What is the purpose of visioning? Why should you invest your time?

- To create a vision of where you want to live, where you want your children and their children to live

Has any other El Dorado County community created a vision for the future and then manifested that vision?

Yes! Almost fifty years ago a handful of individuals saw the opportunity to change their community and did it. While it wasn't easy to set their individual fears and differences aside, in the end they overcame them by finding common ground in the desire to have greater control over their lives and the changes they could see coming to their community. Empowered by a shared vision of the future and trusting that the outcome would benefit everyone, the group created Apple Hill, changing not only their community, but the county and the region as well.

While the vision of Apple Hill addressed many of the elements being considered by this visioning effort, including economic development, community identity, and health and environmental sustainability, one thing it did not consider was traffic circulation. While the example of Apple Hill teaches that it is possible for a community to create a powerful vision of the future, it also reminds us to be open to possibilities, and to not only assume, but to expect that a vision can become a reality.

El Dorado's train depot was located on the north side of town and sat on the rail line that connected Sacramento with Placerville in 1868. The old school house in the picture still stands today.





A Peek into the Future

Diamond Springs and El Dorado Community Vision

The distinct, small foothill communities of Diamond Springs and El Dorado are steeped in Gold Rush history and are integral links in the Golden Chain Highway, State Route 49. As you roll into town, the thing that catches your eye is that the area has retained a visible link to the Gold Rush era by thoughtfully maintaining the historic character of the core downtown area of each community. Located just minutes from a major commercial district, the transition from modern commercial architecture to the historic downtown area invites you to step back in time and experience a slower pace of life. Buildings from the 1800's have been maintained according to strict historic guidelines intended to celebrate the history of the area while new buildings in the historic core are constructed with an eye towards historic detail, right down to the painted on soot stains above faux gas lamp fixtures. A sense of history ripples through each town, inviting visitors to stay a while and enjoy the history that comes to life in these two charming and vibrant foothill communities.

In addition to its roots in the Gold Rush, the communities of Diamond Springs and El Dorado also honor the culture and traditions of the Miwok Tribe, people whose lives were anchored to the land through rituals and sacred sites long before the first nugget of gold was discovered. Spaces within each community are dedicated to preserving and documenting the Miwok Tribe's unique sense of place, the story of their connection to the land experienced as sacred ground that inspires people travel to the area to study the rich collection of information and learn about the "old ways" of Native American life in the foothills of California.

Visitors to the area have the opportunity to experience their own connection to the land by using one of the many bike and walking paths to access scenic vistas such as fields of lupine and poppies in the spring, a herd of deer grazing on the tawny grasses of summer, or to see leaves of yellow and gold blanketing a secluded path in fall. Multiple gathering spaces along the trails, especially in the railroad park or along the El Dorado Trail, invite a picnic or just a brief rest stop in the shade of an oak tree. Residents also enjoy the quiet living and unique neighborhoods that dot the area surrounding the two small towns. Many walk or bike to their most common destinations and a strong sense of community is evident in the friendly greetings as neighbors meet on street corners and in the cooperative problem solving that occurs in town hall meetings.

Both residents and visitors delight in the fine food that is found in the restaurants and outdoor cafes sprinkled along the main streets of Diamond Springs and El Dorado and in the unique shops that make the area a popular destination to find that special gift. Delicious meals prepared by local chefs feature locally grown food, fine pastries, and El Dorado County wines. To take a taste of the community home with you, shop the farmer's market in Diamond Springs on a Saturday morning and enjoy live music from local bands as you browse through rows of locally grown fresh fruit and veggies, cut flowers, pastries, and things not usually found at a supermarket like organic heirloom tomatoes. After you've spent a day meandering through the towns by car, foot, or pedal, then head out of town to enjoy the South County wine country or head east to Apple Hill, but come back again another day to rediscover Diamond Springs and El Dorado, two unique foothill communities flourishing in the present through their connection to the past.

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



THE VISION PROJECT AREA IS THE SHADED AREA ON THE MAP BELOW



Next Steps in the Planning Process

EDCTC was awarded a \$250,000 Community-Based Transportation Planning Grant by Caltrans to fund the Diamond Springs and El Dorado Area Mobility and Sustainable Community Plan (Community Plan). The results of the Vision Project, including the work of the SAC and the Community Visioning Workshop, will inform the direction of that planning effort which will begin in early 2012.

The objective of the Community Plan is to:

- Enhance modal choices and connectivity to meet future transportation demands and to identify the multi-modal transportation infrastructure and land use planning that will provide the foundation for long-term economic and community well-being while protecting environmental, historic, and cultural resources.
- Streamline Caltrans' Local Development - Intergovernmental Review (IGR) process in the project area.
- Provide an implementation plan, including cost estimates and funding strategy for recommended improvements.
- Leverage State and Federal funding.
- Identify updates needed to documents such as the 1989 El Dorado County Historic Design Guide.
- Coordinate with County Planning and DOT to facilitate implementation of relevant elements of the El Dorado County General Plan, such as Policy 2.4.1.2, community design guidelines.


CONCLUSIONS

The values and vision “straw man” developed by the SAC was validated by the community’s comments at the visioning workshop.

- Lasting Legacy: The community now has the first bones of a vision and set of values to provide a context for infrastructure improvements to the community:

“How will transportation and other infrastructure improvements support the community’s values and vision?”

- The vision and values are living documents that can help the community determine where they want to go before they decide how to get there.
- The Diamond Springs and El Dorado Community Advisory Committee is a natural home for these documents.
- Vision Project resulted in a planning process that can be replicated in other small communities of the county: Pollock Pines, Camino, Pleasant Valley, Fairplay, Somerset, Georgetown, Cool, Coloma.
