REQUESTED ACTION

None. This item is for information only.

BACKGROUND

The Transportation Development Act (TDA) §99238.5 requires El Dorado County Transportation Commission (EDCTC), as the Regional Transportation Planning Agency, to ensure the establishment and implementation of a citizen participation process including provisions for at least one public hearing in the jurisdiction represented by the Social Services Transportation Advisory Council (SSTAC). Since the El Dorado County Transit Authority (EDCTA) currently claims all TDA funds for transit purposes, the formal unmet needs process and analysis referenced in the <u>TDA Statutes and California Code of</u> Regulations does not apply.

DISCUSSION

EDCTC conducted a citizen participation process public hearing for public transportation on December 3, 2020. EDCTC staff received two comments from the public via e-mail. The two comments were forwarded to El Dorado County Transit Authority (EDCTA) for their review. Below are the two comments and EDCTA's responses:

1) Comment: I am a disabled passenger of EDC transit. I would like to see the bus be made fare free during the quarantine as it was previously and also dial-a-rides be made free to disabled passengers as it was before, this was very helpful, although I feel as though dial a rides should run a little later in the day than 5 PM. I am also very upset still about the current bus schedule as it has limited many of our abilities to get around places and made it a lot more difficult. I would like to see the bus schedule return to what it used to be before with 2 Placerville busses. Life would be a lot easier for those of us with disabilities to get to more stops locally without having to walk.

Response: The El Dorado County Transit Authority (El Dorado Transit) commented that due to the economic impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic, El Dorado Transit expects significant and possibly long-term reductions in major revenue sources. As a result, we have been forced to downsize some services, to cut staff and to reinstate fares. The recent changes to the local fixed route system were designed to reduce overall costs while maintaining timely bus service to most of our previous bus stops. We understand and regret that the changes created inconveniences for some passengers. We remain committed to doing what we can to provide service for as many people as possible and we are constantly reevaluating opportunities to improve service as we recover from the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic.

2) **Comment:** Please start cleaning the buses on the hour again. They have been absolutely disgustingly filthy lately and COVID is running rampant.

Response: The El Dorado County Transit Authority (El Dorado Transit) commented that it remains committed to the highest standards of health and safety for its passengers and continues to employ enhanced COVID-19 related cleaning protocols. Bus operators are required to wipe down commonly

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touched areas on the hour and to do a more thorough cleaning at the end of the each day. In addition, buses used in public service are fogged with disinfectant three times per week.

The comments and responses above have been forwarded to members of the EDCTC SSTAC for their consideration.

SUBJECT: FREEWAY SERVICE PATROL 2020 REPORT

REQUESTED ACTION

BACKGROUND

On May 5, 2016, the El Dorado County Transportation Commission (EDCTC) entered into a Professional Services Agreement with Extreme Towing of Placerville to continue a Freeway Service Patrol (FSP) on US 50 in El Dorado County. FSP began on December 13, 2010 and now operates from 6:30 AM to 9:00 AM and from 4:00 PM to 7:00 PM Monday through Friday. FSP is a congestion relief program which provides emergency tow and other services to the travelling public on US 50 from the El Dorado/Sacramento County line extending eastward to Greenstone Road. FSP is funded by the Capital Valley Regional Service Authority for Freeways and Expressways and the Caltrans FSP program. *No local funds are required to provide FSP service in El Dorado County.*

DISCUSSION

EDCTC works closely with the California Highway Patrol (CHP) to administer the FSP. CHP performs tow truck operator and vehicle inspections and monitors daily FSP operations. CHP provides inspection reports to and communicates with EDCTC regularly. EDCTC monitors the quality of FSP service through an online survey which each assisted motorist is directed to at the time of service. The survey offers the assisted motorist the opportunity to rate the quality of the service, make comments, and recommend improvements. To date, EDCTC has received many completed surveys, all of which highly praise the EI Dorado County FSP. All survey responses rate the FSP as "excellent" and thank the EDCTC for providing the service. Some of the comments received include:

"I was headed up to Reno for medical procedure and really had my mind on that when I ran out of gas on the freeway. I couldn't believe that happened; it was really scary and I had my dogs with me too. I called AAA and they said they were very busy and gave me a 45-1 hr time estimate. I thought great...an hour on the freeway and every car that passed I jumped a bit and held my breath. So freaked out....when in the rear view mirror a white tow truck pulled up with John Bradford at the wheel. Man, I cannot say enough about how I felt....well...rescued. Yes, RESCUED is how I felt! And I am not one that looks for help to often but I sure needed it. He was courteous and made me and my dogs feel safe and at ease. Towed us to a gas station and even had to add couple gallons since I had run dry...dry.

Fast forward to today when we were all going around the virtual table on Zoom for Thanksgiving and telling what we were thankful for this year. Yes, my Family, Friends and also added John Bradford and FSP since he was my HERO that day, I really needed help and sure am late writing this too.

On a side note: AAA did call me an hour after I had called and canceled their service and let them know that John w/ FSP had already solved my problems already. John and FSP.... really fantastic service and a moment I truly grateful for!!

"John.Bradford#31974 was a God-Send not three minutes after my Xterra over heated and died there he was like a knight in shining Armor Thank you John and Xtreme Towing your the Greatest and Soo AWESOME!!!"

"John Bradford, is a God sent. We had just broken down in an unfamiliar area. He towed us to a safe location and stayed with us while all arrangements were made with AAA to pick up our vehicle. John was as nice as they come. By the time we were done, I wanted to invited= him to our house for dinner. FSP is very fortunate to have John Bradford working for them."

In addition to the online survey, EDCTC monitors the FSP by recording and monitoring specific details of the FSP duties performed. Each motorist assist is recorded via a mobile device application by the tow truck driver. The assist record includes information regarding the time and date, type of vehicle, location, type, and duration of assist performed. To date El Dorado County FSP service has been operating on par with many of the more urban FSP services. EDCTC collects and records this information monthly.

BACKGROUND

CalCOG serves as a convener, bringing together its members, the League of California Cities, and the California State Association of Counties, to share information on successful regional programs. CalCOG also works to assist each member agency in developing capacity to serve its member's needs for regional coordination and policy development.

The Executive Director participates on the CalCOG Directors Association of California (CDAC). El Dorado County Transportation Commission's annual CalCOG dues for 2020/2021 are \$3,800.00, which is based on a population factor.

This is achieved through education and information sharing among the members and with others, such as regulatory, funding, and decision-making entities. BACKGROUND

The Overall Work Program (OWP) and Budget is the primary management tool for El Dorado County Transportation Commission (EDCTC) and contains a description of the activities to be undertaken by the Commission in the coming fiscal year along with detailed budget information. The attached draft OWP and Budget has been developed in compliance with the California Department of Transportation (Caltrans) guidance for Regional Transportation Planning Agencies and has been reviewed by the Technical Advisory Committee. It is expected that the draft OWP will undergo continued refinement as staff receives comments from the Commission and Caltrans. The Draft OWP also includes the goals and objectives for the coming fiscal year. These high-level overarching goals and objectives are often carried forward from year to year but may be amended, changed, or replaced at the pleasure of the Commission.

DISCUSSION

The work elements in the OWP include on-going operations and grant funded projects. The total Draft Fiscal Year (FY) 2021/2022 OWP and Budget is \$1,826,015.

The Goals and Objectives are presented for consideration as part of the FY 2021/2022 Draft OWP to provide high-level direction and consensus for EDCTC staff and Commissioners. The goals and objectives are focused on issues and opportunities presented over the past year and expected to continue through this upcoming and future fiscal years.

The Final OWP and Budget will be reviewed in detail with the Chair and Vice Chair in May and presented for adoption at the June 2021 Commission meeting.

SUBJECT: URBAN SURFACE TRANSPORTATION BLOCK GRANT PROGRAM PROGRAMMING

REQUESTED ACTION

Adopt Resolution 20/21.20 (Attachment A) approving the programming of \$1,175,350 in Urban Surface Transportation Block Grant Program (STBGP) funds to the following projects:

1. Merrychase Drive - Country Club Drive Bicycle and Pedestrian Improvements: \$562,000

2. Silva Valley Parkway - Harvard Way Intersection Improvements: \$613,350

BACKGROUND

As the Regional Transportation Planning Agency (RTPA) charged with programming federal and state transportation funding to investments across the West Slope of El Dorado County, El Dorado County Transportation Commission (EDCTC) is responsible for the programming of Urban STBGP funds to various transportation projects or programs. Urban STBGP funds are reimbursable federal aid funds, subject to all the requirements of Title 23, United States Code. Eligible costs include program planning, preliminary engineering (including environmental studies), right-of-way acquisition, capital costs, and construction costs associated with an eligible activity. Urban STBGP funds can only be utilized in the portion of El Dorado County that is within the contiguous Sacramento Urbanized area, consistent with US Census data. Attachment B are maps of the Sacramento Urbanized area of El Dorado County for which STBGP funds can be applied.

DISCUSSION

On January 13, 2021, the El Dorado County Department of Transportation (DOT) requested Urban STBGP funding to be programmed by EDCTC to support the delivery of two projects. Projects for which DOT is requesting funding are as follows:

- Merrychase Drive Country Club Drive Bicycle and Pedestrian Improvements
 - Total Updated Project Cost = \$1,459,000
 - o CMAQ Funding = \$897,000
 - o Urban STBGP Needed = \$562,000
- Silva Valley Parkway Harvard Way Intersection Improvements
 - Total Updated Project Cost = \$1,394,850
 - o CMAQ Funding = \$322,653
 - STBGP Funding = \$458,847
 - o Remaining Urban STBGP Needed = \$613,350

Each of the two projects seeking funding were anticipated to go out to construction in 2021. However, DOT recently identified cost increases presenting challenges to timely project delivery. Increased costs were realized when DOT updated their estimates to reflect the latest unit prices, which have increased over the past year. The increased unit prices combined with increased costs associated with environmental review and utility coordination have resulted in higher-than-expected project delivery costs. Furthermore, as DOT refined the design of each project, additional critical project elements were identified to include extended driveway alignments, paving resurface limits, and proper drainage requirements.

Any unutilized Urban STBGP funds remaining at the completion of the proposed project will return to EDCTC for future programming.

The current unprogrammed balance available in Fiscal Year 2020/2021 of \$4,248,992 will be reduced to \$3,073,642 as a result of this programming action.

The EDCTC Urban STBGP Fund Spreadsheet in Attachment C shows the programming history and available future funds.

RESOLUTION OF THE EL DORADO COUNTY TRANSPORTATION COMMISSION APPROVING PROJECTS TO BE FUNDED WITH URBAN SURFACE TRANSPORTATION BLOCK GRANT PROGRAM FUNDS

WHEREAS, pursuant to California Government Code, Title 7.95, Section 67950, the El Dorado County Transportation Commission (EDCTC) was created as a local planning agency to provide regional transportation planning for the area of El Dorado County, exclusive of the Lake Tahoe Basin; and

WHEREAS, California Government Code Section 29532.1(g) identifies EDCTC as the designated regional transportation planning agency for El Dorado County, exclusive of the Lake Tahoe Basin; and

WHEREAS, it is the responsibility of EDCTC, under the provisions of the Memorandum of Understanding with the Sacramento Area Council of Governments (SACOG), to program and track projects to be funded with Urban Surface Transportation Block Grant Program (Urban STBGP) funds; and

WHEREAS, on January 13, 2021 El Dorado County Community Development Services Department of Transportation submitted a request to EDCTC to consider the programming of Urban STBGP funding to two projects within the Sacramento Urbanized Area of El Dorado County that conform with the funding requirements therein; and

WHEREAS, El Dorado County Department of Transportation determined the estimated amount to complete the projects included in the request to be \$1,175,350; and

WHEREAS, as of February 4, 2021 the available Urban STBGP fund balance is \$4,248,992 in Fiscal Year 2020/2021; and

WHEREAS, the projects submitted for consideration for programming has been determined to be Urban STBGP Eligible; and

WHEREAS, any Urban STBGP funds remaining at the completion of the programmed project will be returned to EDCTC for re-programming to an Urban STBGP Eligible project.






